this sensitive depiction of an anguished self destructive man is the story of impoverished reverend josiah crawley who uses a large cheque to pay his debts and is accused of theft the charge sends shockwaves through barsetshire as its citizens become bitterly divided domineering mrs proudie wife of the bishop is convinced of crawley s guilt and attempts to hound him out of his job while his family stand by him and strive to maintain their dignity even when the scandal threatens to destroy crawely s sanity this final volume is the darkest and most complete of the the barsetshire novels
